# Message from Mrs Crompton



We are at the beginning of our transition work throughout school. Last week we welcomed our new Reception families, it was a very busy evening and thankyou to our Nursery families who came and enjoyed the evening, even though they know school, families came and took the time for their children to enjoy and meet their friends and the new children who will be joining us. Year 2 children have started to meet their Year 3 teachers and staff from the Junior school. Both Mrs West and Miss Wilkinson have spent time with each child 1-1, started to get to know them and listened to them read. We will be passing on all of the children's information to give the children a flying start. In school, classes have started to think about the next year group. Reception children are spending more time sitting down working independently ready to start in Year 1. It is quite a change for children to manage from Reception to Year 1. The expectation of Year 1 is that children are sat working all day, every day. We manage this with great relationships and fun lessons, but need parent support to continue practicing those phonics and reading skills over the long summer break.

'Let's Get Talking' this week was all about School Readiness - if you missed it, please ask Mrs Aspden for an overview of how to make sure your child is ready for school in September. It is really important your child has the best start.

Huge WELL DONE to all our Year 1 children who took their Phonics Screening test this week. A fantastic collective effort by the children, staff and parents who have been reading every night at home has resulted in lots of happy, confident children who can sound out and blend letters together to make words. We are really proud of you all!!

The man in the picture is Rishi Sunak, the Prime Minister of the UK.

It is in the news that Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, has announced there will be a general election on 4th July. This means people will vote for who they want to be the member of Parliament (MP) for the area they live in. An MP is a person, who will speak for all the people living in an area. They have a seat in the House of Commons in London, where lots of meetings happen and decisions and rules are made for the UK. After people have voted for who they want to be their MP, the votes will be counted, and the winning MPs will be announced. A lot of MPs belong to a party (a group who all work together). The leader of the party that wins the majority of seats for MPs will then become the prime minister.

Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, has announced that a UK general election is to take place on 4<sup>th</sup> July. He made the announcement in a press conference outside 10 Downing Street. Parliament was dissolved on Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> May, and the members of Parliament have returned to being members of the public. Many are campaigning to be re-elected. A general election is when people over 18 can vote for who they want to represent them in the UK parliament. It could mean a new government party and new leader for the UK this summer.




