NURSERY

In Nursery Carle class this week, we have been learning all about Autumn. We have enjoyed using our senses to explore outdoors and collect pine cones, acorns, conkers and different types of autumn leaves.

Our colour of the week has been yellow and we have created yellow leaf rubbings and collaged our own autumn leaf, thinking carefully about which colours to use. We have also been finding matching pairs as part of our Maths learning.











This week, we have finished our first
Literacy text, Peace at Last by Jill Murphy.
The children have retold the whole story
today! AMAZING! In maths, we have been
exploring measuring - looking at capacity
and mass. The children made themselves
into human weighing scales and explored
the weights of different objects around the
classroom. In PE - we have been 'Rolling,
Rolling, Rolling' - so much we felt dizzy! We
had some fantastic forward rolls from the
children. Well done!



DONALDSON





Donaldson class have had another busy week. At the beginning of the week, the children spent some time looking at their faces, identifying features. They then painted a self portrait to be displayed in our classroom. In Maths we have been exploring mass and capacity. Children were human balancing scales and identified what would happen to the scale if something is heavier and lighter. In PE the children were practising their rolls. They did forward rolls, eggs rolls, teddy bear rolls, rock and rolls and pencil rolls.

BRICHT

In Bright class this week we have started our unit on addition and subtraction by looking at part whole models and how parts combine to make a whole number. We have been innovating the story of 'Lost and Found', creating new characters and practising our new opening to the story. The children have enjoyed finding local places they recognise using maps and Google Farth.







JEFFERS





Jeffers Class have been looking at ordering numbers in math this week.

We have ordered from smallest to greatest then greatest to smallest. In RE we have continued to look at special books and explored some Bible stories. We talked about the lessons that the Bible can teach and drew pictures of our favourite story.

PERCIVAL

In Percival class this week we have enjoyed dancing and singing. We have had fun using collision detection in our coding lesson making a frog change into a knight. In science we have investigated suitability of materials, looking at why we use different spoons for different purposes.









BRIDGE CENTRE

This week in The Bridge Centre, we have been mostly looking at our targets. We set up a carousel of interventions, so we could move from one to another but, our favourite area was the "taking turns table", where we were showing patience and resilience by waiting for everyone to have their own turn at being bitten by the dragon!

Head lice are a normal part of childhood - surveys among primary school children have found that nearly 1 in 10 have head lice at any one time.

If you're a parent you probably know what a hassle it is to treat head lice and just how frustrating it can be when your child comes home scratching their head yet again. But parents, you've got the power to stop head lice in their tracks!

By following a simple three step process, Check-Treat-Complete, you can fight back against these bug bullies.



If you find live lice, firstly, don't worry. Head lice are a normal part of life and are nothing to be embarrassed, panicked or ashamed about.

How to get rid of head lice?

There are FOUR types of head lice treatment:

- Non-pesticide treatments
- Pesticide lotions and liquids
- Wet combing with conditioner
- Alternative treatments

NON-PESTICIDE treatments work in a different way from conventional pesticide treatments. They kill the lice by coating and either stripping away their waxy coating, causing them to dehydrate or blocking the opening to their air tubes, disrupting their ability to manage water. These physical mode of actions mean there is theoretically no chance for the lice to build up a resistance. There are three main active ingredients currently in use, dimeticone, isopropyl and activdiol.

PESTICIDE based treatments have been around for many years but there is now evidence that head lice already have, and continue to, develop resistance to some of them. There are two main types which work by poisoning the lice but evidence suggests that levels of resistance to these treatments are rising.

WET COMBING removes lice and nits but does take time and patience to ensure a thorough job is done. It's quite easy to miss a few and needs to be done twice a week for at least two weeks.

ALTERNATIVE TREATMENTS and herbal options are available – although their effectiveness varies.

All it takes is three simple steps:

CHECK

- Your child's hair once a week
- Use a proper detection comb to trap head lice, preferably white in colour so they can easily be seen
- If you find live lice, consult a pharmacist for treatment advice
- If head lice are spotted, take a close look at all the family, including yourself, and ask close family and friends to check as well

COMPLETE

- Check that all head lice have gone within 2-3 days of the final application to complete the treatment
- If the pack instructions specify that a second application is required, repeat the treatment for second time seven days after the first to kill any lice that may hatch from eggs during that time
- Continue to check for head lice on a regular, weekly basis

TREAT

- Only treat if live lice are identified
 Use a clinically proven treatment, ideally with a physical mode of action to which lice are very unlikely to build up resistance
- Leave the treatment on for the recommended time for maximum effect – leaving it on for longer will not make it more effective

If you find live lice tell your school, friends and family straight away so they can check as well.
